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PASTORAL PONDERINGS

Dear Friends in Two Rock and Tomales,

As summer comes to a close, so does our summer sermon series on "The Top Ten". I continue to be thankful to those of you who shared with me your "top five" or "top ten", your favorite Bible passages, your go-to texts when you are looking for hope, comfort, and encouragement in Scripture.

When I sorted different people's favorite passages into ten groups for preaching, I began to notice certain themes that are important to you. Some passages you chose speak of your earnest desire to be in relationship with our Lord and to seek out God's presence and kindness. Other passages lifted up your desire to live rightly before God, to do what is right and good, to the glory of God and the well-being of God's people. Yet other Biblical texts focus on the community in Christ: how we might live together within the church, so that we show forth the mercy and justice of our Lord, and how we might relate to the wider society.

I noticed also what kinds of passages are not part of your "Top Ten": no one wanted me to preach about hell, or about a coming rapture, or about who gets to heaven. It seems that all of us trust in the goodness and

faithfulness of our Lord, and that we believe that the God who gives us life and new life in Christ is always with us and for us.

As the final Sunday for our "Top Ten" sermon series approaches, the passages before me are John 15:1-17 and 1 John 4:7-12. The Gospel text concerns **Jesus' saying about the wine and the branches** and his commandment that **the disciples love one another**; the Epistle text contains a similar exhortation to show forth God's love and kindness by our love for one another.

Jesus' parable of the wine and the branches holds some significance for me personally: it was a passage well-loved by the Reverend Bill Fredrickson, my pastor when I was a member at San Geronimo Presbyterian Church. I remember his interpretation of this text: we need the love of Christ and the support of the Christian community more when there are storms in our lives, just like a grape vine needs to be firmly attached to support wires to withstand heavy winds. And we need the mercy of God and the encouragement of our church more as we grow in life and as we grow older, just like a grape vine needs more support when it grows in size and gets heavier with age.

As we come back from vacation and back to school, may we also come back to church joyously to worship God! For all of us need our Lord's grace and strength, all of us need our congregation's care and love, not only during life's storms but also as we grow in years, wisdom, and wonder.

THANK YOU'S

After staying for 7 ½ years, the renters of the **Two Rock Church Manse** moved out on June 10. The very next day, elder Kathy Stroke had lined up the first of many workers who would come over the next two months to repair, improve or clean things at 7 Tomales Road in Two Rock, which is the street address for the manse.



With the strong support of session, Kathy and Cliff Stroke took the lead in the manse renovation, acting as general contractors and also doing a lot of hands-on repairing and cleaning. Session hired a pest control service; had the heating ducts redone; the entire ceiling fully insulated; the walls in the whole house freshly painted; the floors in the bedrooms and hallway redone with long-lasting linoleum planks; three doors replaced; fans installed in the bathrooms and over the kitchen stove; windows washed; and the septic tank inspected. Cliff Stroke installed new faucets in the

bathrooms and kitchen and hung new mirrors and light fixtures; he changed out the door hardware, so that all deadbolts are keyed alike; and he insulated and drywalled some walls in the garage.

In addition, Kathy and Cliff spent a lot of time in the evenings and on weekends cleaning the kitchen and bathrooms, washing and polishing woodwork, and soaking and scrubbing all window coverings. They worked long and hard, and it was a labor of love.

To tackle things outside the manse, session hired a local service to prune bushes and trees, remove overgrown shrubs, and haul away debris. Then Ben Visser and Peter Koroitamana, under the direction of elder Paul Lewis, raked, straightened walkways, moved pavers, weedwacked, etc. Final landscaping will be done after we have had some rain.

A huge thank-you to our Two Rock session: Kathy Stroke, Lonnie Wernstrum. Paul Lewis, and Gail Turcotte. Thank you all for working together and supporting one another in tackling this big project! Thank you to Cliff Stroke, master electrician and master of renovations! Many thanks also to treasurer Mel Todt who kept track of expenses and paid bills; and thank you to the congregation for your support and prayers.

JOYS TO SHARE

Congratulations to Tomales member **John Mitchell** who turned 86 on June 22.

John was born at the old Petaluma General Hospital in 1932, the second of Viola and Alex Mitchell's three children. John grew up on the Mitchell family ranch in Tomales, went to the town's elementary high and schools, and was a member of the 1950 graduating class. He attended UC Davis for one year but then returned home to work on the family ranch. From 1955 to 1957, John served in the US Army and was stationed in Georgia and Arizona. At the end of his enlistment, he took the long way home to California, visiting Army buddies in New York and various other states along the way. He was back in Tomales by the time he had turned 25.

Soon John joined a young people's social group, and it was there that he met Joan Colledge, a teacher at McNear School in Petaluma. Joan was the love of John's life, and the couple was married at Joan's home in Napa in June 1958. After that, John and Joan moved to the family ranch in Tomales.

When Liz and John "Mitch" were born, Joan stayed home with the two children for about eight years. In 1967, she became a substitute teacher at Tomales Elementary School, and a full-time teacher in 1968. John continued to work on the Mitchell ranch until 1969. Then he worked as a milker for neighboring ranchers, and from 1974 on milked full-time for Al Poncia. John retired from milking in the mid-1980's and began driving cars for Hertz, a job that he loved and held for over 25 years, until 2013.

The illness of John's beloved wife Joan and her death in 1994 brought much sorrow to the Mitchell family. How good that John could rely on the love of his children Liz and Mitch and on the support of the Tomales community.

Since his earliest years, John has been part of Tomales Presbyterian Church; as an adult he was active as trustee and elder, and any area where his help was needed. Each fall, John loved going to the County Fairs in Petaluma, Sebastopol, and Santa Rosa; he enjoyed reading his newspaper at the end of the day; he loved rides through the country side and walks along the beach; and he cherished his years as a docent for the Tomales History Center.



John celebrated his 86th birthday at home, cheered on by his children Liz and Mitch, dear friends, and caregivers from Hospice. In spite of his frail health, John likes to have visitors and reminisce about the town he loves and the families and stories he has known all his life. God bless you, John, with continued good care, with love and kindness, and with some joy to brighten each day.

Congratulations to Two Rock member **Olga Pallo** who turned 90 on August 13.

Olga was born in Petaluma in 1928, the youngest of Carolina and Dominico Bordessa's eight children. She was raised on the family ranch in Two Rock, and as a child spoke some Italian at home. Olga attended the local elementary school, walking across the fields to the old school house that is located across the Two Rock Coast Guard Station. She also attended Two Rock Church with her family. After sixth grade, Olga went to Junior High School and then to High School in Petaluma. She graduated in 1947.

In High School, Olga met Ray Pallo; the two courted, and then were married in 1948. The couple moved to Cotati, where the first four of their children were born. After eight years, Olga, Ray and their children moved back to the family ranch in Two Rock, so that Olga could take care of her father. Seventeen years later, in the early 1970's, Olga and Ray purchased their house on Seavey Road, where Olga resides to this day. Olga and Ray were married for 66 years and six months, until Ray passed away in 2014. Olga and Ray have seven children, two boys and five girls; all their names start with the letter "D". There also are fifteen grandchildren and lots of great-grandchildren.

Olga was always a home maker and caretaker of her family; but she also worked outside the home since she was a teenager, doing housework for other families in the area. Decades later, Olga is still stepping up to clean the kitchen after worship on Sundays, bake for Tuesday's Creative Crafts Group, and do dishes during Abelskiver Fundraiser and Harvest Festival. For fun, Olga does embroidery, sews, and spends time gardening harvesting fruits and vegetables — all of which she gladly shares with others. Thank you for your kind heart, Olga!

© Here is some exciting news for all families in Tomales, Two Rock and surrounding villages: Scouting is coming to our area through the enthusiasm and effort of Tomales Church member Tim Graves.

When Tim grew up Moraga in the East Bay, scouting was part of his life: he was a Tiger Cub as a preschooler, a Lion of Light in Kindergarten, a Cub Scout in grades 1-5, and then a Scout between the ages of 11–17. Tim's whole family was involved in scouting; he loved every part of it; and already at the age of 14, he earned the rank of Eagle Scout! Tim likes to point out that scouting provides an environment where children can learn important life skills and life values, and can do so in settings that are supportive and safe. Through hiking and camping, excursions with their pack and their den, and time spent with other children and trusted adults, scouts learn from a young age to be self-reliant and to collaborate with others, to be independent and to ask for help when needed, to make ethical choices and to grow in character. These values are expressed well in the Scout Law:

A Scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent.

While scouting was a formative experience for Tim throughout his youth, the character traits he acquired and the experiences he gained will stay with him for the rest of his life. Now an adult. husband to Amanda, and father of three children, Tim realizes how he continues to value the Scout Law and how he actually looks for the character traits of a scout in others. in friends, neighbors, and co-Because workers. scouting continues to be so important to him, Tim wants to offer that to the next generation, so that they may reap the same opportunities and benefits that he received.

So here is what is happening: Thanks to Tim's leadership, Pack 123 was chartered over the summer under the auspices of Tomales Presbyterian Church. The pack's name is a reference to the geographic coordinates of Tomales and Dillon Beach (38.2463° N, 122.9056° W; just about 123° W). Church Elder Eric Knudsen, himself an Eagle Scout, is the liaison between scouts and church. Pack 123 meets the third Thursday of every month at Tomales Presbyterian Church; the first gathering was held on August 16. Each pack has smaller Dens of about 5 children who are all in the same age group; dens also meet monthly. So children may attend two scout meetings a month.

Scouting is a family affair that involves mothers and fathers as volunteers, assistants, and den leaders. And because of a recent **change in policy at Scouts BSA**, it is now open to all genders, so that girls and boys in a family can do scouting together. Pack 123 is for children who will be 4 years old this fall through youth in grade 5, and is open to kids from Tomales, Dillon Beach, Two Rock, Valley Ford,

Bodega, Salmon Creek, Marshall and other nearby hamlets.

Each month, the activities of the pack and den meetings will vary: camp-outs are planned for September and February; there are hikes, and a pinewood derby; and for Founders Day in Tomales, Pack 123 will be part of the color guard — they have been practicing in the church sanctuary how to handle the flag of the USA.
